More than 150 people attended the first Pennsylvania Wildlands Conference held in State College in January 2001, a conference organized completely on a grassroots level. The excitement and energy generated by that event spurred the creation of the Pennsylvania Wildlands Recovery Project (PWRP), a new 501(c)(3) educational and scientific organization dedicated to the development of a comprehensive conservation network plan. Several such plans have already been developed by conservation biologists an supporters in other regions of North America. Some of the better known examples include Yellowstone to Yukon (Y2Y), the Sky Islands Plan in the Southwest and, more recently, the Maine Wildlands Network. A growing array of state-based and regional groups like PWRP are springing up across the continent. Most, if not all, are working in close affiliation with The Wildlands Project office in Vermont. Wildlands Project board members include such well-known conservation biologists as John Terborgh of Duke University, Michael Soule, and Reed Noss. As the threats to the natural world intensify, conservationists and environmentalists everywhere need to combine forces and go on the offensive. It's time to craft our own, positive vision for a wilder--andsaner--future. If we wait to protect natural areas until the bulldozers are at the gates, may already be too late. Ask the brook trout.
